Kirk on Campus Program Debuts at Hope College

he Kirk Center's new outreach initiative called Kirk on Campus held its first event on November 16, 2017 at Hope College, in Holland, Michigan. Three distinguished public intellectuals—New York Times columnist Ross Douthat, historian and former New York Times Book Review editor Sam Tanenhaus, and Senior Editor of First Things Mark Bauerlein—engaged in a discussion concerning "Trump and the Future of American Democracy." Hope College professor of political science, Dr. Jeff Polet, moderated the panel.

More than 600 attendees packed the auditorium for an evening of serious yet lively conservative thought.

During the course of 40 years, Russell Kirk spoke at over 400 American campuses on themes ranging from political thought and practice, educational theory, and literary criticism, to modern culture. He also debated some of the most high-profile socialists, liberals, and radicals of the era. Following in that tradition, Kirk on Campus is a unique source of cultural conservative thought, which fills a critical niche in the national conversation. The program will bring scholars unashamed but not uncritical of the great legacy of America and the West to schools across Michigan and its neighboring region. In doing so, it will contribute to a greater variety of thought and informed opinion, as well as to cultivate much-needed civilized discourse.


KIRK CENTER FELLOWS SPOTLIGHT Former Center Fellow translates *The Roots*of American Order into Russian

Then Dr. Kirk's important book The Roots of American Order was first published in 1976, who would have believed that it would be published in the former USSR more than 40 years later? Translated by Marina Kizima, a Professor at the Department of World Literature and Culture of Moscow State Institute of International Relations, the Russian language edition has just been published. Dr. Kazima has twice participated as a researcher in the Fulbright Program at Yale University and at Harvard University. American literature, culture and intellectual tradition have always been in the center of Dr. Kizima's scholarly interests.

While writing her first book on the literature of the American South, Marina completed most of her



research at Dr. Kirk's library as a residential Fellow. In addition, Dr. Kirk arranged for her to meet Andrew Lytle, one of the Southern Agrarians, and have a series of talks with him. This research produced the book *Glimpses of the* Southern Literary Renaissance: the Fugitives, the Agrarians, and the New Critics which was published in Moscow in 1995. Subsequently, she has been a visiting Fellow at the Kirk Center on several occasions. The Kirk Center thanks Marina for her perseverance in translating this key guide to Western civilization into the Russian language.

Collected Letters of Russell Kirk Forthcoming

I maginative Conservatism: The Letters of Russell Kirk, a selection of 190 of Dr. Kirk's most provocative and insightful letters, will be published by the University of Kentucky Press in May. Carefully annotated by editor James Person, the collection includes correspondence between Kirk and prominent figures T. S. Eliot, William F. Buckley Jr., Ray Bradbury, Arthur



Schlesinger Jr., Charlton Heston, Nikolai Tolstoy, Wendell Berry, Richard Nixon, and Herbert Hoover, among many others. In addition, there are letters to less famous but no less significant friends, family members, colleagues, students, and ordinary readers of Kirk's syndicated column.



Japan Marks Kirk Centenary with Publication of *The Conservative Mind*

hile Russell Kirk did much to enliven our particular Anglo-American tradition of conservatism, the universal dimension of his work is finding a new audience in a much different cultural context. This spring, the Japanese translation of *The Conservative Mind* was published in two volumes by Chuo-Koron Publishing, one of the oldest and most prestigious publishers in Japan.

Translator Hiro Aida is a professor at the School of Global Studies and Collaboration at Aoyama Gakuin University in Japan and a well-known journalist. In a forthcoming article for *Shukan Toyo Keizai*, a Japanese economics weekly, entitled "The Conservative Thinker Kirk Tells Us the Meaning of the Marx Revival," Professor Aida suggests that the centennial of Russell Kirk's birth in 2018 might be an occasion to help better understand the bicentennial of Karl Marx's birth this same year. He writes, "Russell Kirk tells us in his magnum opus *The Conservative Mind* how to read Marx, who seems to come back to us at this age of confusion."

The Kirk Center congratulates Professor Aida on this magnificent achievement. It is a reminder that Kirk's works speak to the Permanent Things that we share across cultures.

2018: THE CENTENARY OF RUSSELL KIRK'S BIRTH

Russell Kirk was born on October 19, 1918 in Plymouth, Michigan. This year, the Center celebrates the centennial of his birth with a number of events and publications focused on Dr. Kirk's life and work. The first event was a public lecture by historian and journalist Dr. Lee Edwards on "Our Cultural Crisis: A Kirkian Response" at The Heritage Foundation in Washington, D.C., on March 14. The well-attended lecture was live streamed for an international audience.
