

THIRTY YEARS OF THE WILBUR FOUNDATION PROGRAM

For the past thirty years, since 1979, graduate students writing dissertations or scholars writing books have resided in Mecosta as Wilbur Fellows in four small houses provided by the Wilbur Foundation.

Frequent in-house seminars, with presentations by the Fellows, help to form a close and stimulating intellectual community and friendships that are often life-long. The roster of former Fellows, which primarily includes

professors and scholars, also includes lawyers, librarians, journalists, media specialists, translators, publishers and many others from a variety of fields, even extending to an elected member of the European Parliament.

While they are in residence, which can be anywhere from a few weeks

or months to a year, the Fellows have access to the Kirk Center's Library of 10,000 volumes on history, literature, philosophy, theology, law, politics, and economics. The Center's extensive archive contains all

was established by Marguerite Eyer Wilbur, the author of several books about early California history. Mrs. Wilbur knew Russell Kirk and his work and in 1979 asked him to be president of her small foundation, a position he held until his death in 1994.

Currently Gary Ricks, a lawyer in Santa Barbara, is president of the foundation. Other members of the board are:

Nelson, and former Michigan Governor John Engler. The productivity of the hundreds of Wilbur Fellows attests to the continued vitality of this program.



REMARKS BY SPASIMIR DOMARADZKI ON HIS RESIDENCY

From day one I felt surrounded by people ready to discuss every issue that concerned me and to encourage





While Wilbur Fellows are in residence, they are able to take part in activities held at the Center. Presently, the Center brings together students and scholars for a day or a weekend to participate in seminars and conferences held throughout the year to discuss not only the historic and intellectual roots of conservatism but also how an understanding and appreciation of the permanent things can serve as an antidote to the disorders of the day.

In addition to organizing and hosting its own public and in-house seminars, the Center works with other groups to co-sponsor programs. These groups include The Intercollegiate Studies Institute and The Liberty Fund, who have a joint program for graduate students and young college professors. They come two or three times a year for conferences. ISI began sending undergraduates to seminars in Mecosta in 1973, and they have come every year since then, sometimes several times a year... for more than three decades now.

The McConnell Center for Political Leadership at


the University of Louisville brings their political science students to the Center as part of their course of study.

The Kirk Center also cooperates with a new group based in Michigan but who hope to sponsor

business, the professions, and blue-collar workers—in effect, to that portion of the public who wish to learn more about the basics of conservatism both in theory and in practice.

Finally, the Center also publishes two journals, *The University Bookman*, the nation's oldest conservative review, founded in 1960, and *Studies in Burke and His Time*, a new journal founded by the Kirk Center in 2000.

We hope that these programs carried on by the Russell Kirk Center will help
